U OF W RADIO TAKES LISTENERS BEYOND AIRWAVES AT MUSIC FEST

Usually confined to the airwaves broadcast from the CAW Student Centre basement, the University of Windsor's eccentric campus ra-dio station, CJAM, ventured out of the studio to host an all-day music festival on Saturday.

Higher Ground Music and Arts Festival transformed both levels of Sandwich Town's Mackenzie Hall Cultural Centre into an immersive listening space. It marked the second year the station has invited its most streamed musicians onto the

stage to connect with audiences.
"Like a lot of arts institutions, CJAM was hit so hard by COVID, and we kind of fell into obscurity," said CJAM's station manager Lix Sellick.

"We lost a lot of our hosts. I just wanted to find a way to connect us back to the local music community and get us out there. Events like this are a great way to bring new music to new listeners, find new hosts, find people who are

the basement of the University of Windsor.'

The festival was made possible

through a \$25,000 grant in the most recent round of Gordie Howe International Bridge project community benefits. The station was one of 13 organizations awarded

"It allowed for the festival to be completely free to the public," said Sellick, adding that more than 500 people attended throughout the day.

"We're paying all of the artists and not having to charge cover. We're really, really grateful to be able to make music and arts more accessible to our community."

True to its eclectic program-ming, the festival offered a diverse

range of musical styles. Soft Cult, a female-led grunge duo from Kitchener, was the headduo from Altenener, was the nead-lining act. Among the local musical groups was psychedelic rock band The Brandy Alexanders, and alter-native folk ensemble, Bitters. Tune into CJAM 99.1 FM or vis-
